Effective Instruction and Leadership:

 As the resignation of our Meadowlark Elementary principal was announced during the week of 11/29, I'd like to take this time to publicly thank Ms.
Paula Saavedra for her service to our district. I only wish her well and much success in her future endeavors.

With that said, we have reached out to our community to provide their input on the qualities and characteristics needed in our next school site leader at Meadowlark through a Principal Stakeholder Input Survey. The survey was made live as of yesterday and the window to respond will close on December 22nd. The survey responses will help us build the profile and characteristics to support the recruitment of the ideal candidate for Meadowlark Elementary.

I am truly confident that we will identify the ideal candidate to build on the excellent foundation that is Meadowlark Elementary.

• I'd like to provide a quick update to our progress with AVID, district-wide implementation: On November 30th, my team and I met with the AVID program manager assigned to our district, Mr. Marciano Flores. We have begun the discussion of planning, as we are in our planning year to move forward with district wide implementation of AVID for the 2022-2023 academic year. This would entail:

We are now officially in Year 1- Planning year for full implementation at all 3 schools in 2022-23.

Professional Learning opportunities will be provided to the specific site AVID teams in the upcoming spring semester as part of planning along with a summer institute professional development.

We are eager to take AVID, an in-school academic support program district wide. Thank you to our school board for their support behind this innovative program for all students.

• I'd like to thank the efforts of our Vasquez HS team and our AVC partners, Cathi Hart and Rocio Heasley, we have a robust pool of students who have applied for the first AVC class offering to kick-off at Vasquez HS on January 10th. We are thrilled to have put this together quickly so that our

current Vasquez students have an opportunity to access an AVC course this academic calendar.

Our first dual enrollment offering as you can see examines stress and stressors from a health and wellness perspective.

It is designed to enable all students to understand the role of stress in their lives.

The course focuses on the multidimensional nature of stress, the role of stress in many chronic diseases, and the development of a personal stress management plan. It is based on a holistic approach to stress management, rather than an approach that just teaches a variety of individual coping techniques.

Looking forward, we are planning on adding additional courses to the Vasquez campus in the fall of 2022. One such example will be MUSIC 107: History of Women in Rock - a very popular class.

Again, on behalf of our district, thank you AVC for your collaboration.

• Last week, I had the privilege to attend the annual CSBA conference last week, 12/1 through 12/3. The professional development opportunity provided me with best practices to possibly adopt here at our own district as far as heightening parent engagement opportunities, assessing student social emotional well-being in real time, as well as school district funding concerns and the local control funding formula, just to name a few. Student Connectedness

• The Superintendent's Student Advisory kicked off our first meeting on November 29th with Vasquez HS students in attendance!

The purpose of the Superintendent's Student Advisory is to create and implement goals through student input into areas that impact student performance, safety and security, mental health, and other areas of concern.

The advisory is scheduled to meet once a month. Participating students decided to hold our meetings moving forward at Vasquez HS during their lunch period.

Each meeting, the advisory will cover a goal or area of growth that we work on as a group. Thank you to the participating students as they were articulate and thoughtful with their insight. It is my hope to introduce the advisory to the board and our community in the upcoming months.

COVID Report:

• I'd like to provide an up to date COVID report, data pulled from LACDPH. 941 new cases as reported to LACDPH for December 7th as compared to 1,173 new cases for November 7th, as reported at our last board meeting.

The testing positivity rate, a 7-day average for the week of November 30th is at 1.24% as compared to the week of October 31st which came in at .99%.

Once again, I would like to remind our families, the importance of a self-check at home prior to students arriving on campus. Please look for symptoms such as a cough, fever, and shortness of breath. If you believe your child may be experiencing these symptoms, please contact your school site for additional guidance.

In addition, we genuinely understand that some in our community are concerned about Governor Newsom's proposed mandate on October 1, requiring that students attending in-person instruction be vaccinated against COVID-19 starting the term following full FDA approval of the vaccine for their grade span. To note, the mandate for students to be vaccinated is NOT yet in effect.

The mandate has an anticipated date of July 1, 2022. Again, this is an anticipated date. While we didn't create the mandate, our job is to implement it and keep everyone safe.

School districts are currently being told that exemptions will be available for families who do not wish to have their children vaccinated. It's anticipated these exemptions will include: (pause) medical, religious, and personal belief. If an exemption waiver is submitted, the student can attend school inperson.

We will continue keeping our families up to date as new information comes through.
