COVID Report:

• I'd like to provide an up to date COVID report, data pulled from LACDPH. The number of news cases as reported to LACDPH for September 19th is 1,322. We have seen a decrease in new cases since my last update where we had seen is 1,540 new cases as reported by LACDPH back on September 6th. The testing positivity rate a 7-day average for the week of September 12th was at 1.73% compared to the week of August 30th which reported at 1.98%.

The percentage of individuals tested with a diagnostic COVID test since the week of September 12th comes in at 122,257 compared to August 30th is 147,130 during the week of August 30th.
